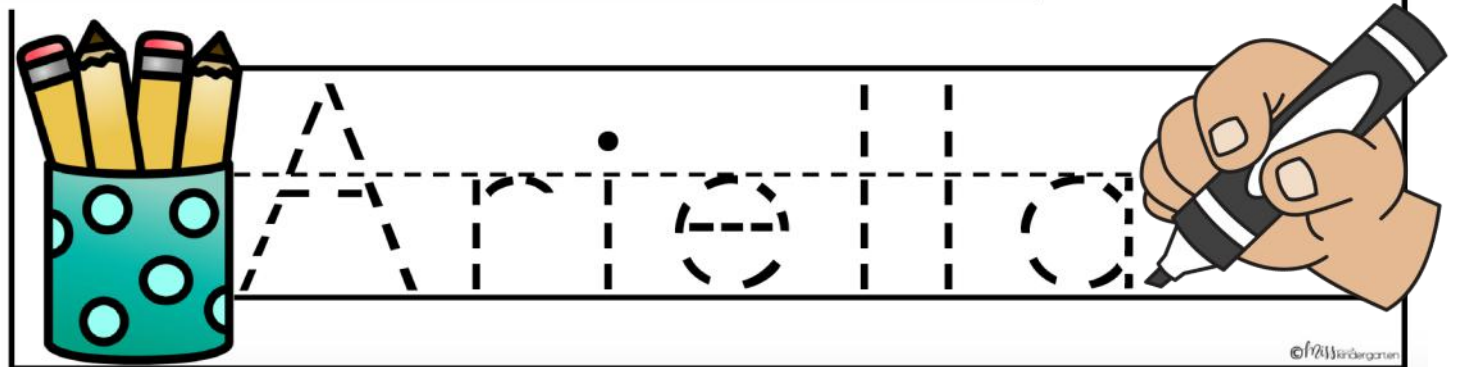
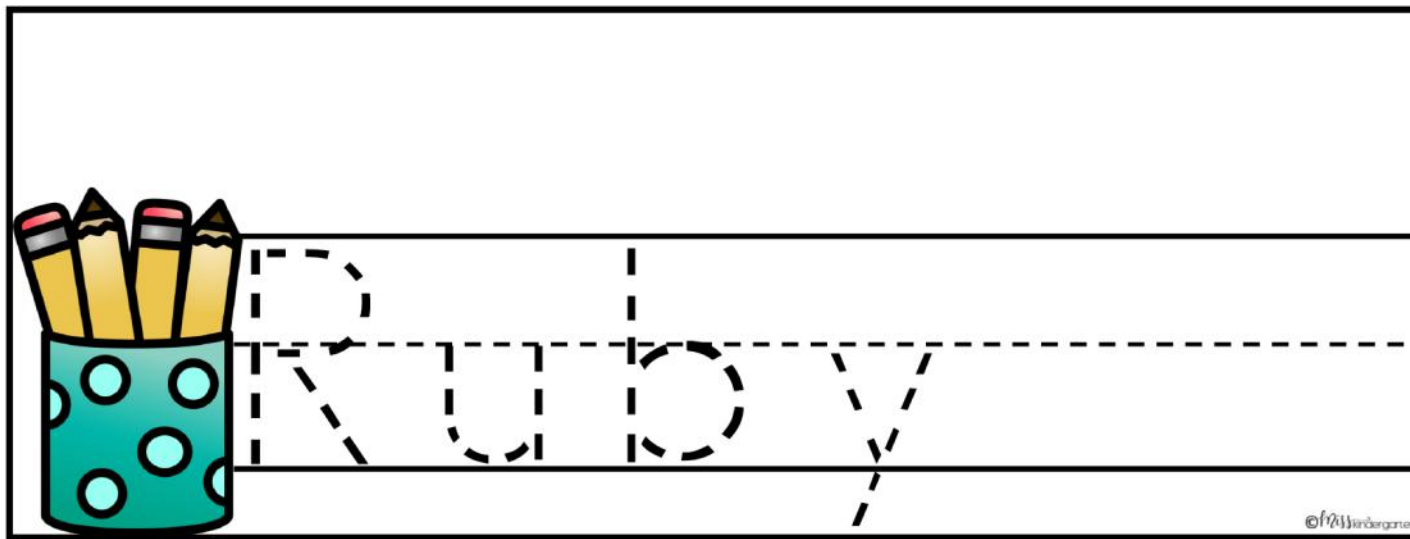


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Name Writing Practice





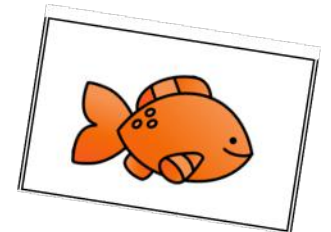
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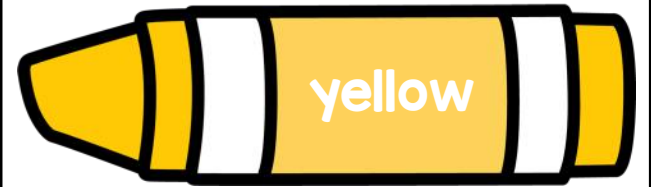
Color Sorting Practice

*note- I have included gray/grey depending on how you spell it. Just use the card you need!

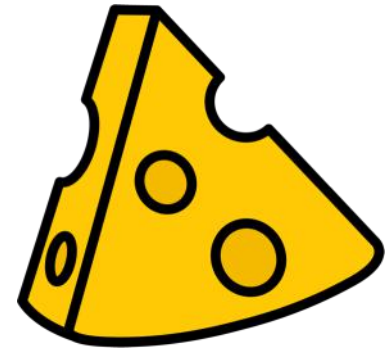
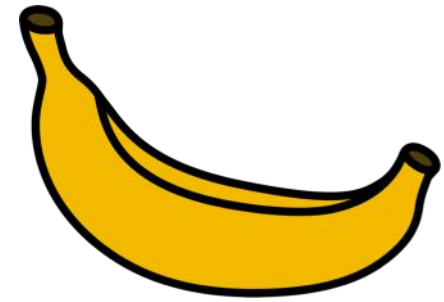
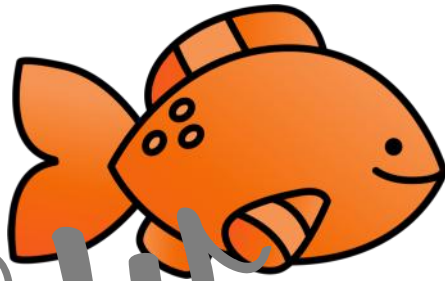
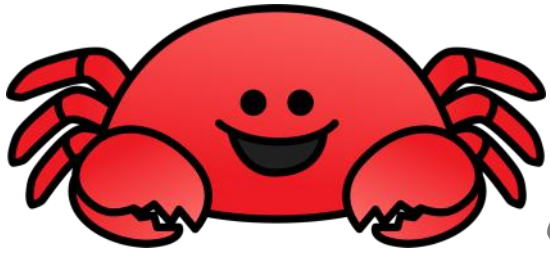
		
		





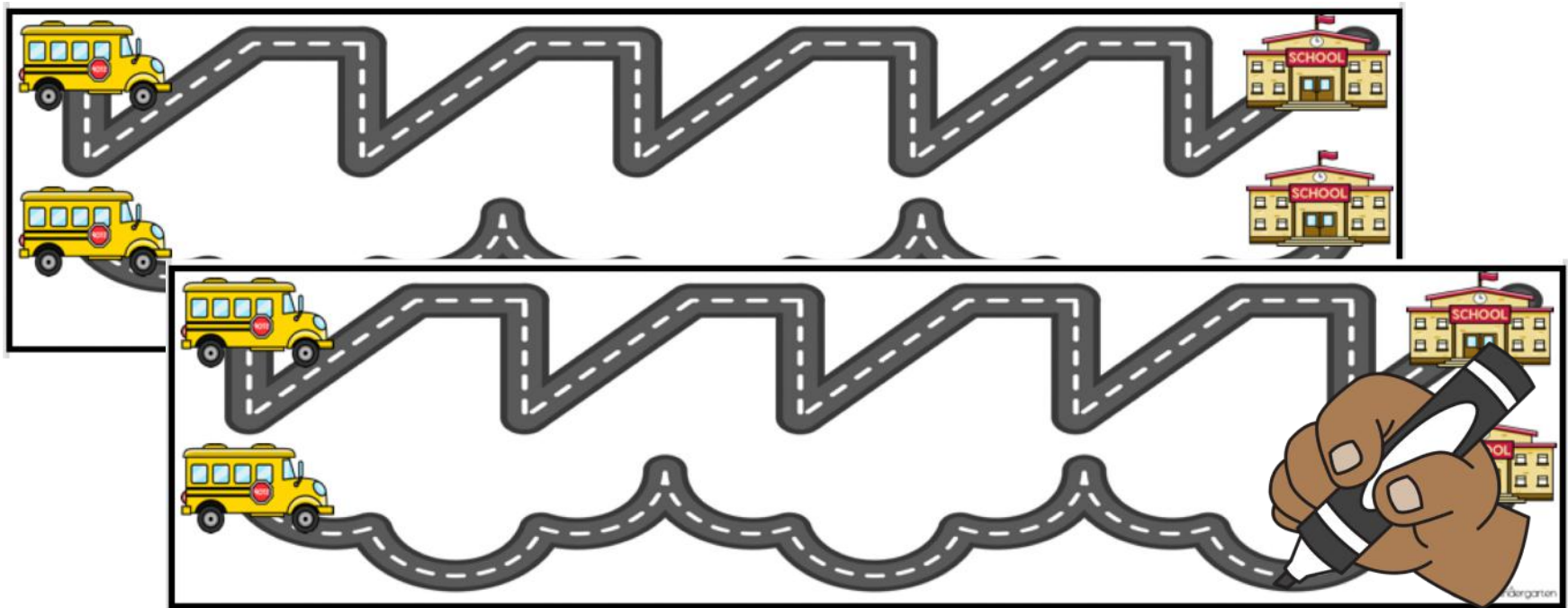

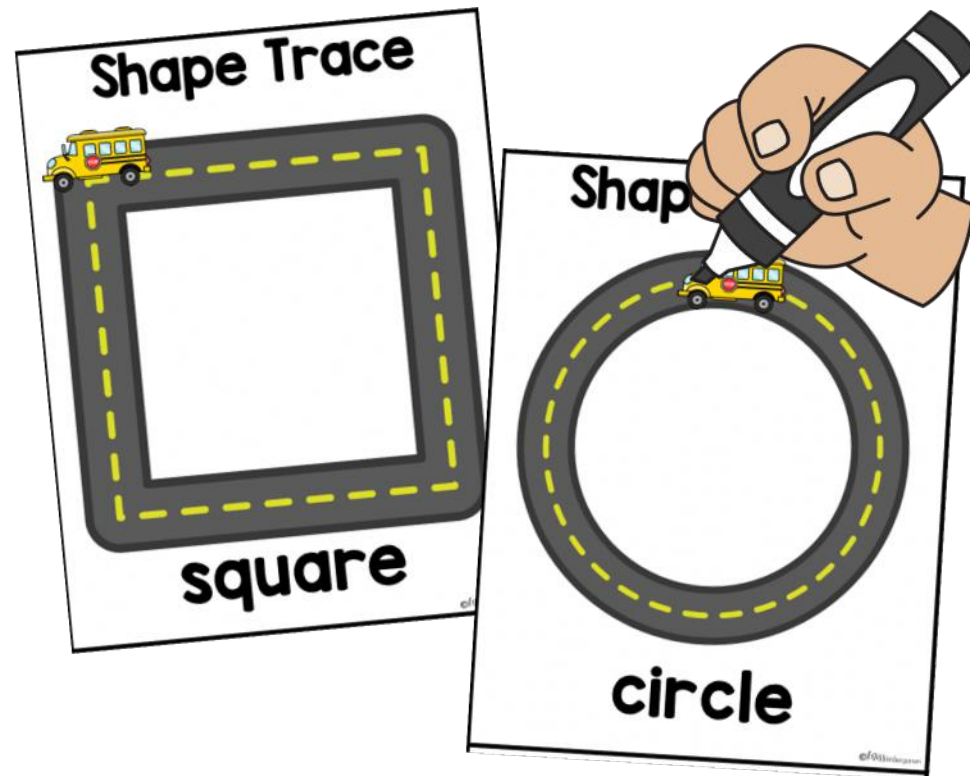
Line Tracing

Shape Tracing

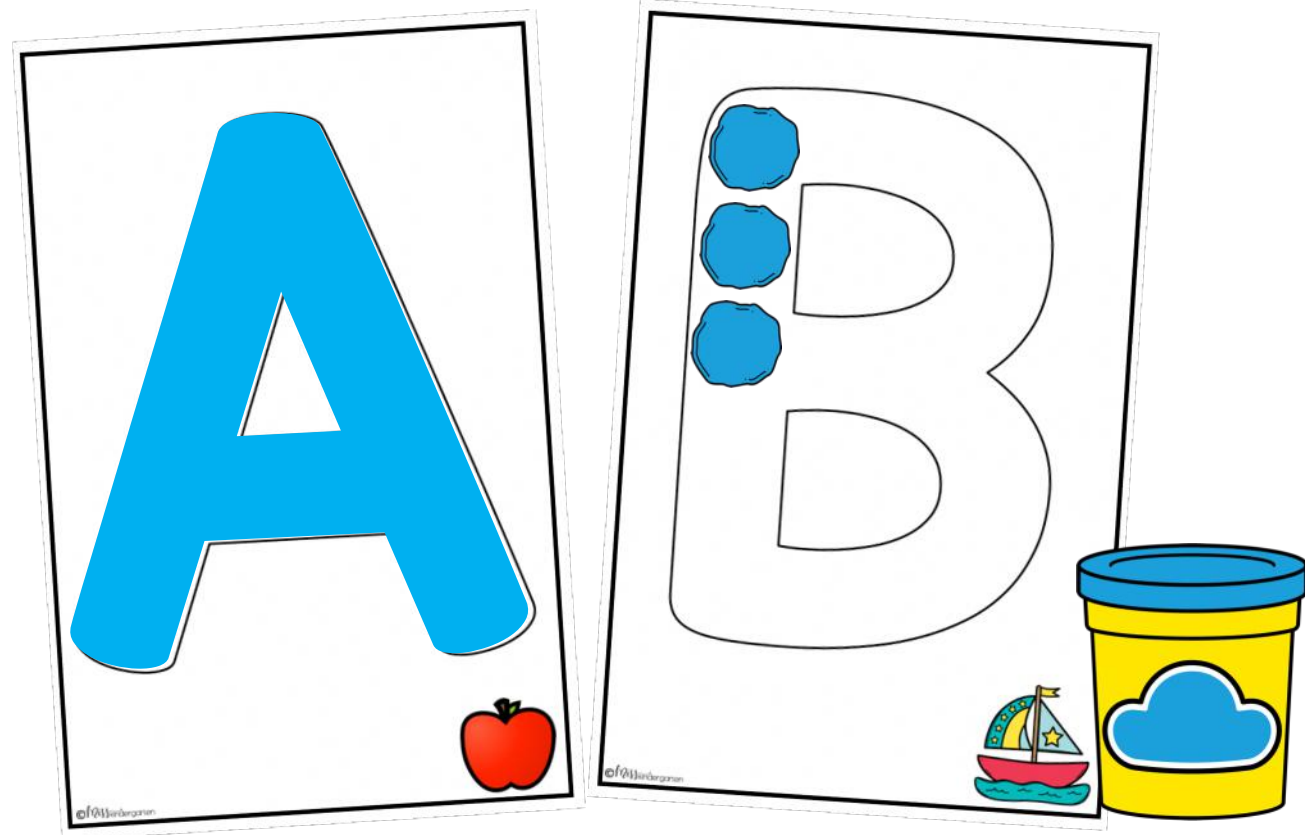
Print the shape cards on cardstock and laminate.

Fine Motor Letters

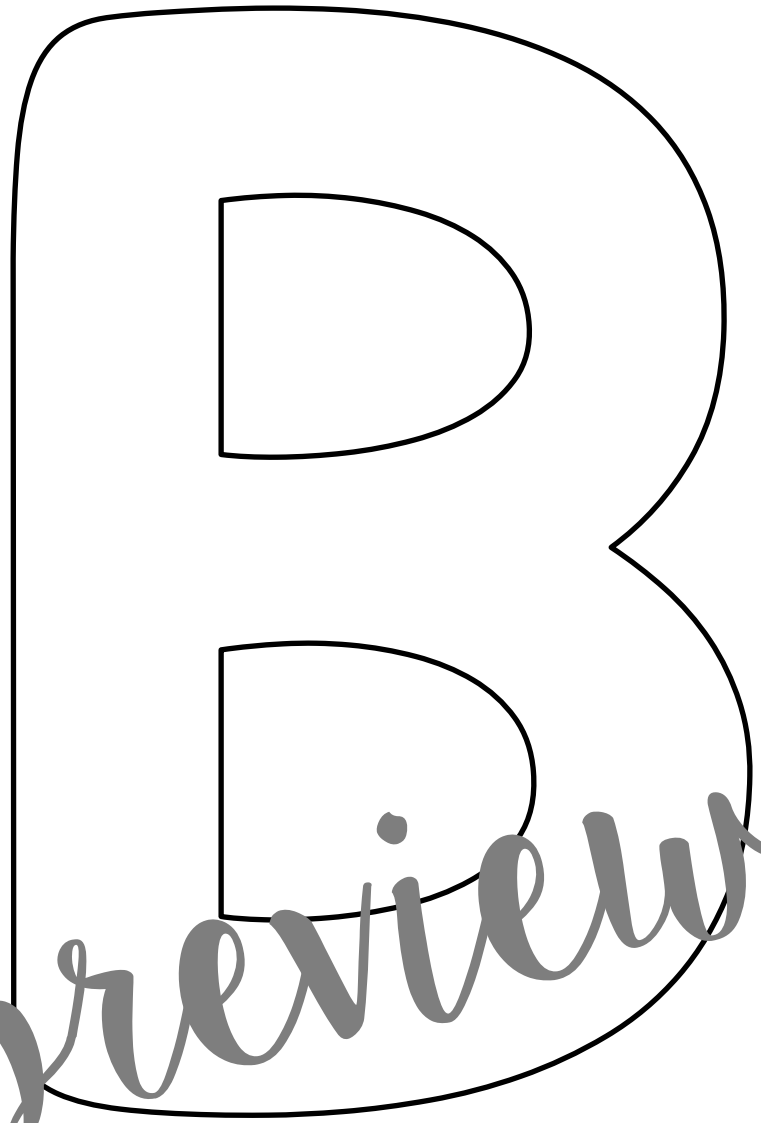
Print the letter cards on cardstock and laminate.

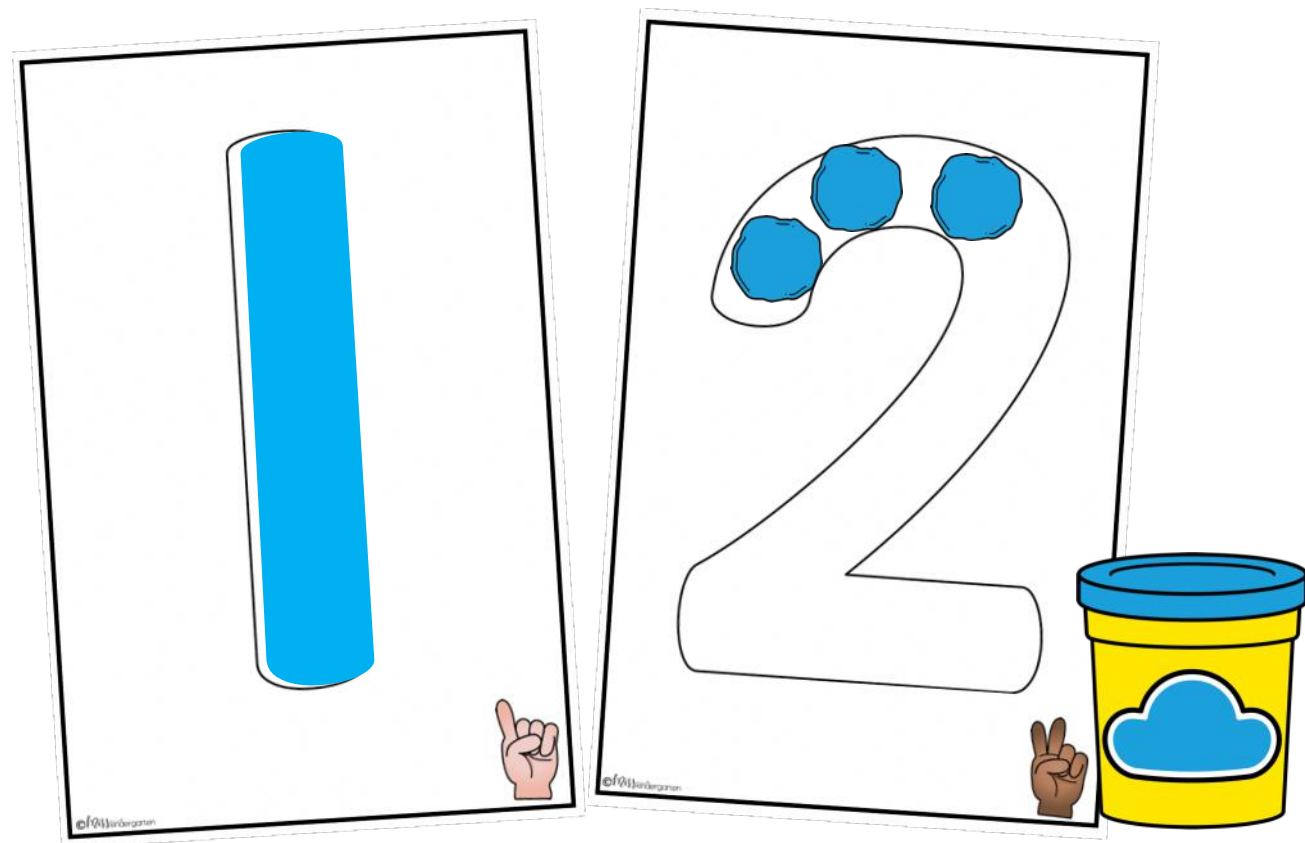
