


## **USING THE BOOKS:**

Little Number Books are a fun way to get your students practice showing numbers to 20 in multiple ways! They can be used in math centers, morning work, or even sent home as extra math practice!

To make the books, fold the paper in half horizontally and then in half again vertically.





) The front cover showcases the number your students will practice. You can have them decorate the number in various ways. Here are some fun ideas! \*Color the number with crayons, markers or colored pencil \*Cover the number with white glue and add glitter or colored sand \*Decorate the number with small stickers or a bingo dauber

{If you have your students decorate the number with something that leaves a texture, I suggest folding the page into a book after they fill out each page}

## **USING THE BOOKS:**


Your students will also have the opportunity to practice tracing and writing each number. For extra practice, encourage them to say the number as they write it. Speaking, writing, and seeing the number will help them learn through several styles of learning! To change it up, you can have your students write the number with pencil, crayon, or even marker.






On this page, your students will show the number in the ten frame using dots or stickers. Then they will color the cubes to show how many for numbers I-IO. Starting with II, they will fill the equation by writing how many ones are in the number.

On the last page, your students will trace the number word and color the stars for numbers I-IO. Then they will show that number by drawing objects. They can also label their drawing.





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
